Local Liberal Democrat campaigner Robert Quarmby contacted Wolverhampton City Council **THREE TIMES** about the amount of litter and fly tipping in Oxley but has not yet received a satisfactory response. Instead the council has passed his enquiry around several departments and then eventually stopped responding.

- ❖ you will need your name, address, date of birth and national insurance number
- ❖ The Open Register of Voters can be sold to senders of junk mail. Your name and address will be included in the open register unless you ask for them to be removed. This will not affect your right to vote.

Robert Quarmby's vision for Wolverhampton

Invest in early-years education and increase pre-school activities across the whole City.

A well educated Wolverhampton



Improve education and lifelong learning and retraining opportunities for our citizens from pre-school to University and an alternative vocational pathway improving apprenticeships in the City.

Introduce free healthy school meals – breakfast and lunch – for all pupils.

A safe Wolverhampton

Prevention is the best approach to tackling crime and the Police should work with local communities, schools, voluntary and local government organisations.

Visible policing is very important as part of a reassurance role and would like to see an increase in the number of Police and PCSOs on patrol.



The Tory's creation of a Police and Crime Commissioner was not the answer as the control of the Police should not be politicised.

A clean and green Wolverhampton



Wolverhampton has some wonderful parks and an abundance of trees that help to make a natural environment nice to live in, work in and enjoy.

But it is spoiled by some derelict buildings, the level of car usage, waste dumping, graffiti and litter.

The Council needs to guide and facilitate citizens in becoming more environmentally aware and protective of the community we share.

The Council should help to make all buildings across the City as close to self-sufficient in energy usage through micro-generation, solar and other energy production.

A well housed Wolverhampton



Increase homebuilding especially on brown field sites and in the City Centre.

Social housing stock to be fully returned to Council control with improved tenant governance participation.

Establish a data base of all private landlords and their properties with the aim of bringing poor properties up to the same standards as those covered by the laws on multiple occupancy as a minimum.
